Constructivist and Existential College (CEC)

Standards of Education, Training and Practice for Supervision (2022)*

- 1. CEC, along with UKCP, is committed to defining and creating appropriate standards for the practice and provision of professional supervision training.
- 1.1 This document applies to Organisational Members (OMs) who train and/or accredit psychotherapists and psychotherapeutic Counsellors as Supervisors
- 1.2 These standards are in line with the requirements of:
 - the UKCP Supervision Statement (2018), which informs CEC's Supervision Statement (2022).
 - the UKCP Supervision Standards of Education and Training (SETS) (2018) which recommends guidelines for each college.
- 1.3 In addition to defining and creating standards this document will provide a route for those who have successfully completed and approved training to be included in the UKCP Supervisor Directory.
- 1.4 Specifically this document aims to set out requirements for the provision and content of supervision trainings.
- 1.5 For the purpose of this document the term 'psychotherapeutic practitioner' will refer to both psychotherapists and psychotherapeutic counsellors.
- 1.6 For the purpose of this document it is assumed that the route to the supervision directory is a post-qualifying one. Thus standards of competent and ethical practice applicable to psychotherapy, as stated in UKCP's Ethical Principles and Code of Professional Conduct are assumed to be a 'given' and not re-stated here. This document will therefore only address aspects specifically applicable to the training of supervisors.
- 1.7 This document will be subject to periodic review and revision by CEC and UKCP as necessary.

2. Route to the UKCP Supervision Directory

- 2.1 Nomination for the UKCP Directory will be done by the OM.
- 2.2 OMs are responsible for compiling and forwarding their own directories to CEC, for information, and the OM will then forward registrants to UKCP for inclusion in the central UKCP Directory.

- 2.3 The OM does not have to be the one that has accredited or reaccredits the practitioner as a psychotherapist and/or Psychotherapeutic Counsellor in order to be included on the Supervision Directory.
- 2.4 Nomination for the UKCP Directory will require the following information:
 - Name, address and electronic contact details
 - Date and OM of psychotherapy and/or psychotherapeutic counselling qualification
 - Details of formal supervision training
 - Name OM nominating the supervisor

3. Requirements for providers of supervision trainings

- 3.1 OMs who provide supervision training courses are subject to the UKCP and CEC supervision standards at their Organisational Member Review (OMR) as is the case with psychotherapy training. Where a training course meets the required CEC SET for supervision it can be designated a Recognised Supervision Training (RST).
- 3.2 For a Recognised Supervision Training to be deemed suitable it should satisfy the following minimum criteria:
 - offer a substantial programme of learning which includes at least a course of 10 days (70 hours minimum) formal training.
 - Ensure a minimum of 40 hours of approved supervised supervision of individual and/or group psychotherapy and/or psychotherapeutic counselling as part of the training programme. This should not be less than a ratio of 1 hours supervision of supervision to 6 hours supervision practice. In the case of group supervision of supervision this would be on a pro rata basis.
 - have an identifiable theoretical model of teaching or approach and offer comparison with at least one other theoretical model of supervision.
 - contain both theoretical teaching and supervised supervision of experiential or live supervision.
 - specify and fulfil a set of Learning Outcomes (as set out below).
 - be taught by supervisors on the UKCP Supervision Directory or equivalent, such equivalence to be determined by the OM..
 - have a formal assessment procedure which may include written work (such as essays, case studies or reflective journals).
 - satisfy the OM's diversity and equality policies.
- 3.3 Providers of supervision training should ensure evidence of the following policies and procedures;
 - selection criteria and procedures,
 - codes of ethics and conduct.
 - diversity and equality procedures,
 - curriculum and course requirements,
 - learning outcomes,
 - learning assessments

- appeals procedures,
- staffing profiles.
- 3.4 The minimum entry requirements for supervision training would normally be:
 - one of the following: a UKCP professional qualification, a UKCP recognised professional equivalent qualification, a psychotherapeutic counselling qualification, BACP accreditation, holder of the European Certificate of Psychotherapy or the equivalent, plus:
 - 5 years of work with clients as a psychotherapeutic practitioner or the equivalent of approximately 1,600 hours, which means an average of 8 clients per week over 5 years.
 - Normally at least three years of this experience must be post-registration as a UKCP Psychotherapist or Psychotherapeutic Counsellor.
 - Evidence of good professional standing
 - Will be in a position to provide 40 hours approved supervision of psychotherapy/psychotherapeutic counselling prior to nomination for the UKCP Supervisor Directory.
 - 3.5 Only those who are on the UKCP registers as Psychotherapists and/ or Psychotherapeutic Counsellors are eligible on successful completion of a CEC RST to be on the UKCP Supervisor Directory.
 - 3.6 Supervisors who are Psychotherapeutic Counsellors are normally expected to supervise Psychotherapeutic Counsellors
 - Supervisors who are Psychotherapists are normally expected to so supervise psychotherapists; and, if also supervising Psychotherapeutic Counsellors are expected to take into account the specific requirements of Psychotherapeutic Counselling.

4. Learning outcomes for supervision trainings

Learning Outcomes for a recognised supervision trainings should include as a minimum the following: The ability to demonstrate:

- 4.1 The fostering an open, trusting working alliance with supervisees in which the supervisee is confident to reveal the difficulties and challenges within their work.
- 4.2 Consideration of more than one theory of supervision with particular reference to the implications for constructivist and/or existential approaches to practice.
- 4.3 The ability to match the style of the supervision to the experience, development level and individual needs of the supervisee, with a particular emphasis on demonstrating understanding and capability to work with diversity and equality considerations and issues.

- 4.4 Ability to supervise both face to face and online psychotherapeutic practitioners who are working face to face and online.
- 4.5 Ability to understand and critique work from the standpoint of the client, the therapist, the supervisor, and the wider context.
- 4.6 Recognition and ability to work, as applicable to the modality's approach to supervision, with the parallel systems, transferential phenomena or similar processes.
- 4.7 Ability to recognise specific capabilities as well as limits of the supervisee, where these may be socio-cultural, temperamental, physical, intellectual and social within the context of the supervisee's life.
- 4.8 Understanding the differences between working with individuals and with groups.
- 4.9 Understanding of the specific context of supervising trainees appreciation of a sense of responsibility for transparency and accountability as relevant and important in professional practice.
